

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE March 18, 2018 5th Sunday of Lent

"Now there were some Greeks among those who had come to worship at the feast. They came to Philip and asked him, "Sir, we would like to see Jesus?" It has begun. News of Jesus has spread beyond native-born, Aramaic-speaking Jews. We don't know if the Greeks mentioned here heard of Jesus from fellow travelers or if news of this intriguing rabbi had reached all the way to their home. What we do know is that this interaction spurred an interesting comment from Jesus: "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified." In other words, it has begun. The time has come for the message to move beyond the geographic bounds of Israel.

But what does this message require? The Gospel is clear: "he said this indicating the kind of death he would die." A grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies to its life as only a seed. A caterpillar takes on the appearance of temporary death in order to transform into a butterfly. In the Gospels, sacrifice and death are a way of becoming something more than you were before. This Lent, new life can come from our sacrifices. When we enter into the season with Jesus, our difficulties can transform our perspective. "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit."

As we abstain from meat and fast from eating between meals, we can grow in compassion for the hungry. We can give alms of our time, sacrificially spending time with the lonely, the sick, and the marginalized. Our little Lenten "deaths" -- death to unnecessary preferences, death to selfish living, death to ignorance of other's pain -- can bring new life to the world long after the season is over. This is the invitation this Sunday and every Lenten season, to begin anew from death to life.

Everyday Stewardship

During the Lenten season we observe certain practices of sacrifice and self-denial as an offering to God and as good spiritual training for this race we are engaged in called life. Our God is calling us to grow in our discipleship and stewardship for the benefit of our souls and the health of the Body of Christ. When we take part in the devotion of the Stations of the Cross, traditionally we say, "Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world." Loving Our Way Through Lent By Fasting

Fasting— doing without. It's not our usual way of life! Our society teaches us that more is better; if you want it you can have it; if it feels good, do it. Why would we not take everything we can get? How does saying no to ourselves help us grow in love? Why does giving up meat on Friday or eating smaller meals make us better people?

We are children of a loving God. As our loving parent, he knows that always having everything we want leads to sinful attitudes of gluttony, greed, envy, and arrogance. If there is never *want*, there can never be a true appreciation for abundance.

Fasting gets our attention. In our parish, hunger is more often a choice than a necessity. Like the other Lenten disciplines, fasting focuses us on the immense gifts we have received from our loving God.

Fasting isn't necessarily about food. It can apply to other realms of our lives, like TV time, Internet games, gambling, drinking, or gossiping. Wherever our lives are out of balance, Lent provides an opportunity to reprioritize. It can be helpful to see fasting as one half of a faith practice; for instance, "I will fast from candy and feast on sharing," or "I will fast from judging and feast on acceptance." Often fasting goes hand in hand with almsgiving, as people choose to give away the money they save when they eat more simply.

As we practice the Lenten disciplines, we are more thankful for the everyday blessings we receive as well as the greatest gift of all, our salvation through the generous love of Jesus at his Passion and death.
