Annual Report of the Pastor Thomas G. Carr

An annual report is designed to reflect on a year that has passed and to look forward to possibilities of the year ahead. Doing so as we end one decade and begin another, the word "transition" came to me over and over again. Of course, life is all about transition, from what has been to what is to come. This year there have been many transitions in the life of our congregation. You will read about these throughout this Annual Report; I'll name just a few.

The increasing number and variety of groups now using our building on a regular basis is one such transition. Our building is a ministry. It has always been used by our congregation and local groups in their good work. This year, we were blessed to see it used even more for good, healthy and meaningful groups throughout the week, including the Suffield Co-operative Preschool which fills our halls with the energy, voices and footsteps of children, parents and staff throughout the week. The major re-design of the Kneece Chapel Common Room has played a significant role in making our congregation more accessible to the greater Suffield community. Part of the increased use is because of the major internal construction taking place at the home of our brothers and sisters at First Congregational Church; it has been a blessing to able to open our doors to assist them during this time of transition in their life and ministry.

The baptisms of nine of our young people in April was a transition and a joy, not only for the individuals who entered the waters of baptism and their families, but for the entire congregation. Baptism is moment of transformation into a new way of being with God in Christ which allows everyone, regardless of age or stage of life, a unique opportunity to reflect upon and renew our own baptismal vows and to prayerfully consider how we can be more faithful followers of the Way of Jesus.

This was also a year of significant loss for our congregation due to the deaths of many long-time members and friends of Second Baptist. Their physical presence will be greatly missed but the multiple and varied gifts they poured out on this congregation through the years, will long be remembered with gratitude. Their legacy, spirit and wisdom will continue to empower us as we move forward in faith.

I am deeply grateful to the committed and gifted staff of our congregation. Though every person is always in transition in some form, we are blessed that Evelyne Battle, Jean Jones, Sue Schneller, Alison Hardy-Dusto and Jennifer Sikes, continue to share their many wonderful gifts on behalf of this congregation for the sake of ministry here in Suffield and around the world.

After a congregational vote on December 29th, we began a partnership of mutual ministry with the Enfield American Baptist Church which closed after 55 years of ministry. We are delighted to embrace EABC as partners with us in ministry and though we will not be legally merging our congregations immediately, we will engage in that process sometime in the middle of 2020. I am delighted to welcome the Reverend Dr. Rachael Lawrence as Co-Pastor. Rachael is a gifted, committed person of faith, ordained to the Christian ministry in the American Baptist Churches, USA in September, 2019. Through December 29th, she served as EABC's part-time Pastor. She will serve ½ time as Co-Pastor, and I will reduce my work as Pastor of Second Baptist to ¾ time. This means that I will stepping back a bit, preaching and leading worship three Sundays each month (or 4 on the 5 Sunday months) and sharing pastoral and a few other responsibilities with Rachael.

As I am in my seventh year with Second Baptist Church as Pastor, I will be taking a four-month sabbatical beginning in May through the end of August. During that time, Rachael Lawrence will be increasing her time in pastoral care and handling more of the preaching and worship leadership responsibilities.

This is a time of transition, not only for our church, but for the world and our country. Things are changing dramatically which causes us to recognize and confront massive challenges. I consider this a time of crisis and in times of crisis, many react with anger, fear and violence, or panic, despair and denial, and often, give up hope. But I happen to think that a time of crisis is a perfect time for the church to actually BE the church and live out our calling as followers of the Way of Jesus. In one of the Chinese languages, the word "crisis" means "dangerous-opportunity." This is an opportunity to live as the light that Jesus calls us. And though we may not be huge in number, every act of kindness, compassion, peace-making and love, matters. As in the poem of Edward Everett Hale

"I am only one, but I am one.
I cannot do everything, but I can do something.
And I will not let what I cannot do
interfere with what I can do."

Let us do that "something" for the sake of the Gospel and the world God so loves. And never forget: "Immanuel; God is with us."

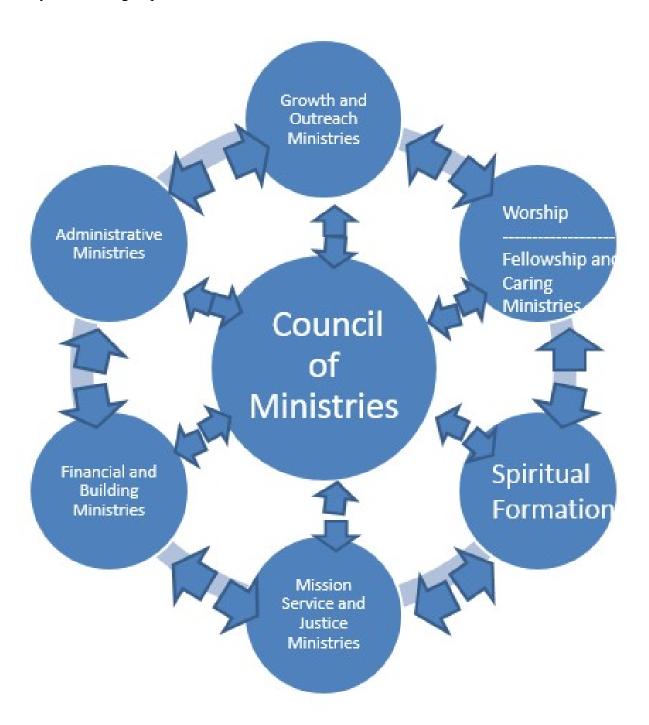

Growth and Outreach

The purpose of Growth and Outreach ministries is to reach beyond the congregation to let the greater community and world know of the mission and ministry of Second Baptist Church and encourage people to join with us in God's good work. We continue this mission through a variety of platforms. The Reverend Carr continues to send weekly emails that directly reach over 200 email addresses and the monthly Crier is published electronically, as well as in paper format for those who do not have access to the internet. Reverend Carr continues to record "radio spots," one minute devotional reflections heard on WJMJ and WTIC and other stations throughout the week. In addition to these communication vehicles, in 2019, we focused on two other channels of communication to the broader community.

Our upgraded website makes processing information more "user friendly" (http://www.secondbaptistsuffield.org). On the website, the Sunday morning worship services are now available in audio format. We are thankful for the continuing work of Jim Grant, Greg Bassos and Dave Burnaford for recording the services each week and downloading these on the website.

Our Facebook page has seen more and more activity this year announcing upcoming events and sharing special services and ministries. Peg Carr and Evelyne Battle continue to be the administrators of the site and we are grateful for their time and effort in letting the whole world know about the ministries of Second Baptist.

As must be mentioned every year, the most effective "growth and outreach" vehicle is you. As you share with friends, family, neighbors, colleagues and new acquaintances the mission of our congregation and invite them to join you, the work of the good news of God for the whole world can flourish. May we all be part of the growth and outreach of Second Baptist Church.

Annual Report of the Diaconate - 2019

- For the Diaconate of Second Baptist Church, 2019 has been a year of challenges.
 These included: assisting our pastor with providing the spiritual resources to help
 grow our congregation, evaluating circumstances and distributing fellowship funds to
 members who have need, overseeing the spiritual needs of the congregation including
 preparation and serving of communion.
- Spearheaded by the leadership of the Reverend Thomas Carr we are slowly attracting new participants to our worship services as well as to other church activities. Membership has begun to grow, but very slowly. The members of the Diaconate took an active role in planning for and leading the spiritual growth activities of the congregation. A huge "thank you" to the members of the Diaconate for their dedicated, faithful, and faith-filled service to our congregation. We are also indebted to past members of the Diaconate for their willingness to step in to help serve in various capacities, particularly the serving of communion, when needed.
- As the congregation moves toward a more volunteer based service model, this change
 in how the church's needs are met has created many opportunities for service. This
 was very evident when Cliff Barron, Jamie Guilmette, and Pastor Carr once again led
 the men of the church in preparing, cooking, and serving the annual Thanksgiving
 feast
- With the help of Congregation Liaison Manager Alison Hardy-Dusto, we scheduled Sunday Morning Worship Leaders. Laura Burnaford spearheaded the Greeters for most of the year until the ushers assumed this responsibility late in the year.
- Working with Pastor Carr, a contingent of Deacons wrote and submitted a grant
 proposal to fund the pastor's sabbatical, scheduled for May August 2020. Although
 the grant was not approved, the planning will be extremely valuable as the sabbatical
 draws closer.
- There were no youth or adult candidates for baptism this year. As in the past, any new
 members of the congregation are welcomed into the Family of Christ here at Second
 Baptist Church with the Right Hand of Fellowship ceremony during worship.
- Through our Fellowship Funds program the Diaconate provided emergency assistance to financially distressed members of the congregation. The Diaconate also contributed funds toward the completion of various projects and services as part of our worship outreach.
- We have sponsored, helped to plan and/or participated in many church events
 including: Lenten breakfast devotions, the Ash Wednesday and Maundy-Thursday
 Services, August Sunday mini-services, Homecoming Sunday, Thanksgiving Dinner,
 Advent worship opportunities, as well as the Christmas Eve Service of Lessons and
 Carols. We also worked with Pastor Carr to obtain and make available to the
 congregation Devotion and Prayer booklets for various church seasons.
- It is our hope that in 2020 we will be able to increase our level of assistance to Pastor Carr as together we work to enhance and increase the spiritual aspects of our congregation's life together. We are also hopeful that through our activities we will become stronger in our faith and closer to God and to each other!

Music Ministry

In addition, there were several special musical programs this year. The Hot Cats Jazz Band joined us on two separate occasions during the year, which has become a wonderful tradition. On Palm Sunday, the Sanctuary Choir presented a suite entitled "When Silent Voices Sing" directed by guest Lorri Cetto, and accompanied by guest instrumentalists.

In the spring, the SBC Choir joined the choirs of other Suffield churches, Suffield Middle and High Schools, and Suffield Academy in a town-wide concert, "Suffield Sings!". SPIRITUAL FORMATION

Spiritual formation is a life-long process of an individual's growth in faith. For some, Christian Education is about believing certain things *about* God, the church, the Bible, and other theological concepts. We believe that the spiritual life is about being in relationship with God, ourselves, others and all life. You can't have one without the other—we have to know about God to be in relationship with him. We have learned that growing our spiritually has many aspects to it with only a small part of that done on Sunday mornings. Mission trips can do things Sunday school cannot; parents and the congregation can model faith to teach things Sunday school cannot; intergenerational small groups can provide opportunities Sunday schools cannot, and worshipping as a congregation can reach people in a way that Sunday school cannot.

Our Children's and Youth Ministry We think the most important thing our ministries can do is help kids know that the God of all creation is their personal God as well and to help them see themselves as part of God's people. We share Bible verses and stories with kids to show them who God is. This way kids come to know the Bible, how to live and deepen their relationships with God, themselves, others and the rest of creation, and how we're to live as followers of Christ. As kids learn these things, they begin to understand how God related to his people through the ages. Each week as we teach Bible verses and model and promote prayer, this consistency builds a foundation for children to know that God is real, a living God with Whom they can have an intimate relationship.

Food Ministry

Building Use Ministry

In 2018, a Building Use Ministry (BUM) was formed. It is led by Evelyne Battle, Laurie Gokey, Nancy Drenzek, and David Battle with help from Karen Santi and ex officio participation of Pastor Tom Carr. The focus of this Ministry is aligned with the theme of the ongoing Capital Campaign ("Open our Doors and Let It to Shine".) Our vision is to more fully use our church premises by partnering with Guest-Users from within Suffield's community.

In 2019, the BUM completed the following objectives:

- 1. Identified the "inventory" of under-utilized rooms in our church and analyzed the capability of these rooms to serve the various needs of potential Guest-Users.
- 2. Explored staffing issues in contemplation of hiring a part-time Building Use Manager
- 3. Created guest-use partnership process & transaction documentation
- 4. Explored legal and risk management issues

As a result of BUM's "inventory" of under-utilized church rooms, it was determined that the Kneece Chapel space would be better used if it were remodeled into an "all-purpose meeting room." The BUM took the lead for this project by overseeing demolition, raising funds, researching materials and designing the new decor. The room has a state-of-the-art audio visual system that can be used for corporate meetings, educational events or just watching a movie!

The grand opening/dedication of the new space took place in September during the celebration of Suffield on The Green. The public was invited to experience the new space and enjoy a free coffee. This project could not have been completed without the help of Ernie and Libby Begin, Betsy and Joe Carr, Laura Burnaford and all of the church committee members that contributed their time, energy and funding.

In anticipation of the increased demand for use of church space by members of the congregation as well as the public, the BUM revised the "Guidelines and Application" form for space-sharing events. During the revisions, the BUM explored legal and risk management issues which resulted in the development of a "Rental Agreement" for longterm guest users.

During the past year, the Suffield First Church of Christ went under renovation which displaced several of their guest-users including the Suffield Cooperative Preschool and AA groups to name a few. Their Guest-Users have become our current Guest-Users, thereby significantly increasing the immediate need for a Part-time Building Use Manager.

The BUM developed a Building Use Manager job description and application form for potential applicants. The job was advertised and the process of interviewing applicants has begun.

Church Staff Relations

The CSRC attempts to meet quarterly as needed to serve in a liaison role to align the interests of the staff and of the congregation.

SBC staffing remained constant during 2019 with one full-time Pastor and five part-time positions: Church Liaison Manager, Choir Director, Organist and Handbell Director, Christian Education Coordinator, and Custodian. Finance and CSRC salary survey confirmed staff salaries were commiserate with CT church staff and due to inflation a 2% salary was recommended to Council of Ministries which was approved for all staff and will be effective in January 2020. During 2019, CSR chair participated in discussions with Building Use Ministries Task Force to finalize a job description for a 6 hour per week position to staff that was added to the budget the last 4 months of 2019. This position was posted, interviews were conducted however no suitable candidate was offered this paid position. Full-year funding for the new position is in the 2020 budget.

One of our ways to support our staff is to ensure that each has performance feedback regularly. The staff has met regularly with the Pastor individually and as a group this year as each part-time staff person reports directly to the Pastor. Representatives from the Diaconate, Church Staff Relations and Moderator conducted a joint review at the Pastor's request during July 2019. During the Pastoral review, we reviewed his accomplishments of starting new short term small groups on Creation Justice and continuing Wednesday and Sunday small groups. In September 2019, the Pastor will have completed six years of service with Second Baptist. In the Pastor's agreement, he is then eligible to take a four-month Sabbatical during his seventh year (between September 2019 and August 2020) and the Pastor agrees to stay with Second Baptist Church at least one full year after sabbatical. Pastor is finalizing plans and working toward taking sabbatical during the summer months May-August 2020 and will work closely with Moderator, Diaconate and others to prepare for his time of renewal as well as church ministry needs while he is away.

Pastor Carr has proposed to reduce his working hours to 75% to create a Co-Pastor position for Rachel Lawrence whom he has mentored the past few years. Rachel comes to us from Enfield Baptist Church and has degrees and programs designed for families with children. SBC approval for this new role of Co-Pastor is up for congregational vote December 29th 2019. In preparation, CSRC wrote a new co-pastor minister/church agreement, and co-pastor job description, and worked out with The Finance Committee a financial proposal in preparation for this new position.

Thank you to each staff member for their continued contributions to the life and ministry of Second Baptist. We are so blessed by each of you and your gifts.

CHURCH HISTORY 2019

The congregation of Second Baptist Church of Suffield continued its usual programs and activities in 2019. The pastoral leadership and care of Thomas Carr continued to inspire spiritual wellbeing and individual commitment to Christian service. There was an increase in the number of community organizations which used our church building. The Kneece Chapel was renovated to create a multi-purpose room. On December 29, a church meeting voted to create a partnership with the congregation of Enfield American Baptist Church which closed. Rev. Dr. Pachael Lawrence became a Co=Pastor with Rev. Carr as Pastor.

The usual community organizations made regular use of SBC facilities: Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, Suffield Academy, Suffield Garden Club, AA, Kent Memorial Library, and Yoga class. Additional groups to use SBC facilities this year: Partnering to Reach Aspirations, a non-profit organization designed 1 to assist young adults on the Spectrum by providing educational opportunities to Suffield residents; "Greater Springfield Music Together, a "family music and movement class for infants, toddlers and preschoolers"; and, Qi Gong and Tai Chi classes. The Suffield Cooperative Preschool from the First Congregational Church moved to the Sisk(educational) wing for the 2019-2020 school year because of construction at First Congo.

Church groups which met on a regular basis were numerous: Fabulous Friday Folders, Helping Hands(Youth), Book Discussion Group, Great Courses class, Springfield Soup Kitchen Group, Sanctuary Choir, Handbell Choir, Folk Group, Also, the Council of Ministries and many of the committees in each one of the Ministries met on a regular schedule.

The church building was well maintained. Volunteers converted the Kneece Chapel to a multi-purpose "common room." A new refrigerator for the kitchen was purchased. Additional handicapped spaces were marked on the rear parking lot.

In January, most groups began meeting. The Dominican mission trip group of four left on the fourth for a week. They took school and medical supplies. A Boy Scout Eagle Ceremony for Mickey Barron was held on the 8th. The Special Needs Fellowship met on the 14th at 8:30 pm. The Book Group met on most Sundays at 6:30 pm. Great Courses met most Wednesdays at 9:30 am. On the 12th, the Springfield Soup Kitchen mission group met at 11 am. The Boy Scouts met on Tuesday evenings at 6 pm and Cub Scout Den 8 met on the 12th at 1 pm. The Boy Scout Board met on the 17th at 7 pm. Helping hands met at 2:30 PM on Tuesdays. A polluck supper/hymn sing was enjoyed in the Fellowship Hall. The SBC annual meeting was held on Sunday the 27th at 11:15 am.

February was a busy month for choirs and the Folk Group as the Lenten season was to begin in March. The Folk Group practiced on the third, tenth and 24th at 8:30 am. The handbell and Sanctuary choirs practiced on Thursday evenings on the 7th 14th, 21st,

and 28th. Springfield Soup Kitchen Mission met at 11 am on the 9th. Special Needs Fellowship was held at 6:30 pm on the 11th. An American Red Cross blood drive was held in the Fellowship Hall on the 13th from 1:30 - 6:30pm. The Boy Scout Board net on the 21st at 7 pm. On Sunday, the 24th at 11:15 am, a Bylaws review informational meeting was held in the Fellowship Hall.

In March on the 3rd, an environmental program and workshop, "Get the Buzz on Native Bees", was held in the Fellowship Half at 3 pm. It was sponsored by FOFAH, the Suffield Land Conservancy and the Green Team of Second Baptist. The Suffield Garden Club met in Fellowship Half on the 4th at 11 am. Trustees Report

It has been the policy of the Trustees to contribute to the operation and mission budgets. The amount is calculated from the 3-year rolling average and 5% of that average. The value of the endowment is that of November 30th of each year. This year, the value is \$4,082,407.32. That is \$285,475.05 higher than last year and due mainly from the stock market performance. The endowment is managed by Bank of America/US Trusts and American Funds.

The contributions this year are shown in the Treasurer's budget report. During the year, we received another class action suit payment from VOYA in the amount of \$18,182.00.

The Trustees voted to push out for one year the repayment of the loan for the steeple repair. Therefore, no decrement to the T-Mobile lease payment will be taken for the loan in 2020.

Many thanks to Jamie Gullemette, Richard Hubbard, Scott Schneider, Ted Sheiber, Art Sikes and Karen Santi, and a special thanks to Art Sikes for crunching the numbers.

Treasurer Report

The following two pages contain the financial statement of the Second Baptist Church for 2019 budget, 2019 actual expenditures as well as the proposed 2020 budget. The final page of the report is the Investment report that summarizes the main checking account, Merrill Lynch Stock activity, Windsor Federal Line of Credit, and the Investment Account activity for 2019. The money held in the investment account is currently held in a savings account and has been earmarked for designated purposes in the future. As of 1/1/2019 there was a starting balance of \$46,340.42 in the investment account and an ending balance of \$61,157.81. Investment increase mainly due to the property upkeep trust funds being held in Investments per request of House Committee.

Mission Support (Treasurer of Missions) is funded through the pledges and plate offering. In 2019 we have contributed 10.2%. Prior year contributions were 13.9% in 2018, 10.1% in 2017 and 10.1% in 2016. For 2020 we anticipate maintaining 10.1% towards Mission support. Current Pledge and Plate was significantly lower (\$23,508) than pledged. Normal House repairs were lower than expected during the year as they continued to manage the Capital Campaign items identified as separate income and expense line items. Trust funds contributed (\$2,508) less than expected due to interest adjustments on the Lamont trust. Trusts will contribute 18% more trust money in 2020 (Approx. \$32,966) over prior year budget mainly due to taking the full T Mobile income into budget this one year to help defer costs of Pastor's Sabbatical. The past 7 years the T Mobile income has been prorated to pay back the Trusts for Steeple repair and will be fully repaid in 2023 at which time the T Mobile income will flow directly into our annual budget. The trusts also had positive investment performance which increased our average of the past three years. You will note the 2019 net loss is negative (\$38,786). However, when offset with the 2018 net income \$40,681, there is a net positive of \$1,895 including prepaid pledges of \$2,630.

In November the Finance Committee met with the Pastor to review his proposal of adjusting his salary and creating a Co-Pastor position if approved after the December 29th special meeting. We have detailed the finance proposals for three separate pastoral positions – Pastor, Co-Pastor and Sabbatical. We also funded Building Use request for a full year for a potential add to staff if hired in January. Brotherhood Mutual Insurance costs provided greater savings than expected in 2019– particularly for the Workers Compensation costs as compared to our prior insurance carriers.

The stock clearing account was used several times via Merrill Lynch and as noted in the investment report, incoming funds received were \$9,358.94 that was deposited into the SBC checking for Memorial, Pledge and Capital Campaign contributions.

PayPal electronic payment service was utilized almost monthly in 2019. Second Baptist received 21 transactions after fees \$11,872.93 was transferred to SBC main checking account. I pulled double duty again this year as SBC Treasurer as well as managing the Capital Campaign (see separate capital campaign reports). Art Sikes continued with the payroll function and expanded our 1099 database for new vendors. Our system of record is QuickBooks for deposits, bank reconciliation, expenses, and financial reporting.

# Report of Nominating Committee 2019

### **Capital Campaign**

### Our Doors are Open – Let It Shine!

The approval to initiate a capital campaign was confirmed at the January 2018 Annual Meeting with the proposal of raising \$350,000 to restore, rejuvenate and renovate the property of Second Baptist Church. The capital campaign officially kicked off on April 1, 2018 and is expected to run three years, closing on April 1, 2021. Our committee of Karen Santi, Michele Brown-Quinn, Laura Burnaford, Etienne d'Otreppe, Becki Fuller, Walt Malec and Pastor Tom Carr worked diligently to reach our fundraising goal. While the three-year pledges are coming in, we solicited a Line of Credit from Windsor Federal Savings and were approved for up to \$150,000, of which we currently used \$67,500.

We have exceeded our fundraising goal and have \$285,906 collected through individual donors, SBC trusts, grants, Suffield businesses and interested contributors.
