Coordinator's Report

Since 2014 when BBBS was born in Rotorua it has rapidly been growing form a happy new born child to what I believe is now a vibrant adolescent in full puberty! Lots of changes and growing pains but all necessary and normal as we reach for further stages of development.

Slowing down to change gears

Some of our statistics are down for the last year. We lost a number of community matches due to the fact that some of the families of the children we serve had higher needs and became challenging for our mentors to engage with.

This led us to see the need to expand our school based mentoring programme so we could offer mentoring to children in more challenging situations and the volunteers could meet with the child in a safe environment. And expand it has! In May we employed Nicki Pugh as a part time School Mentoring Coordinator. Nicki has fitted into the role extremely well and this the programme has gone from just one school with five Police mentors to four schools and fast approaching over 20 matches.

I have recently been teaching my youngest child to drive a manual car. Learning to change gears has been tricky for her! Applying the brake, slowing down and disengaging the motor in order to change gears and then speed up. Our journey with BBBS over the last year has been similar but we are now firmly in a new gear now and enjoying experience of speeding up again and travelling into new territory.

These gear changes also involve developing our strategy and structures so the mentoring is accompanied by effective governance, management and business systems. Recent funding received from The Tindall Foundation has been timely and useful to access outside consultancy as we go through a process of development in all these areas. I am confident of the success of this process as it is built on the good foundation of a fantastic Board of Trustees and great staff. We can also be thankful of being in a strong financial position due to successful community funding applications and wonderful financial support from local businesses and people. As a result we have also been able to purchase a new car and upgrade our old car for a very good second car used by Nicki for the school based mahi.

Uniquely Rotorua

We are constantly striving to deliver our services more effectively to the Rotorua community. Our families and tamariki in Rotorua do have many needs and challenges and we need to continue to find ways of helping as many children as possible including those whose families are also struggling with changes in their situations.

BBBS is an international programme that has strong policies and procedures which are duplicated in a very uniform way all over the world. This is for good reason, primarily so best practice is offered for the safety and benefit of all involved. However, within this framework we need to explore creative ways of bringing great mentors and great children together in a relationship that can help build a brighter future for all.

The BBBS of Rotorua journey continues to be a great ride with fabulous people on board. I finish with a massive shout out to our amazing mentors. Your goodness and selflessness continues to be the backbone of our organisation and it is always a joy and honour to work alongside you all!

Additional Output Measures:

A new School Mentoring Coordinator started in May 2019. This role is a fixed term 12 month contract for 20 hours per week. The key focus of the role will be developing the school mentoring programme into more schools throughout Rotorua.

In March 2019 the Coordinator Support's hours were increased from 12 to 18 hours per week to assist more with mentor recruitment, funding and marketing.

Engaging with local businesses to sponsor staff to mentor during work time has proven to be a very successful mentor recruitment strategy. As demonstrated above this has resulted in much higher mentor recruitment numbers for this financial year.

Reporting Entity

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Rotorua is a registered charitable entity under the Charities Act 2005. These financial statements comprise the financial statement of the Charity for the year ended 30 June 2019.

Basis of Preparation

The charity has elected to apply PBE-SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not for Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses less than \$2,000,000.

All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting.

The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the Charity will continue to operate as a going concern in the foreseeable future.

These financial statements are prepared on an historical cost basis and are presented in New Zealand dollars (NZ\$).

Audit or Review

These financial statements have been subject to a review.

SPECIFIC ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Charity have been applied consistently to all years presented in these financial statements.

The significant accounting policies used in preparation of these financial statements are summarised below:

Accounts Receivable

Accounts Receivable are stated at their estimated realisable value.

Creditors and Other Payables

Creditors are stated at cost.

Revenue Income

Interest income is accrued.

Donations, sponsorship and grants are accounted for as income when they are received but are apportioned to the correct year if unexpended.

Income Tax

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Rotorua is exempt from income tax by virtue of section CW 42(1) of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Goods and Services Tax

This entity is not registered for GST therefore all figures shown in the financial statements are GST inclusive.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies.

There are no capital commitments as at 30 June 2019 (2018 nil).

Contingent Liabilities

There are no contingent liabilities as at 30 June 2019 (2018 nil).

Included in Accumulated Funds is an amount of \$26,724 that was donated from the final distribution of a trust with a similar purpose that was wound up. It is primarily represented in the Investment Account funds.

Note 7 – Restricted Purposes Fund:

This represented a donation received in the 2017 financial year from the Rotary Charity Luncheon specifically for the purchase of a new vehicle. As the vehicle was purchased in this financial year, the Restricted Purpose Fund has been transferred to General Funds.
