

HAMPSTEAD & WESTMINSTER HOCKEY CLUB



- 2. Matches 1-36 shall be 18 minutes each way, with an interval of 1 minute; matches 37-43 shall be 20 minutes each way, with an interval of 2 minutes; match 44 (the final) shall be 25 minutes each way, with an interval of 5 minutes.
- 3. Matches to be umpired by the Middlesex Hockey Umpires' Association.

RULES AND INFORMATION

1.GENERAL

1.1 Video recording is permitted at the ground for training and private non-commercial uses, only. Any club wishing to take advantage of this must contact the Tournament Adminstrator in writing as soon as possible.

1.2 All matches will be played on artificial surfaces and

appropriate footwear must be worn.

1.3 Each team should bring two sets of shirts of contrasting colours; in the event of a colour clash, the first named team shall change their shirts.

1.4 Subject to any matters contained herein, all matches shall be played in accordance with the Rules of the Game of Hockey. The decision of the umpires shall accordingly be final on any matter arising during the match; in all other respects, any ruling by

the Tournament Adminstrator shall be final.

1.5 City Centre Leisure Limited, Westminster City Council and Hampstead & Westminster Hockey Club will not in any circumstances accept any responsibility for any article lost, stolen, or damaged within the Sports Complex. The centre staff are forbidden to receive, or take charge of, money, jewellery or valuables, or any article belonging to any club or person using the Sports Complex, in any circumstances what so ever. In their own interests, persons are advised not to leave money or other valuables in the dressing rooms. Each club/person being granted the use of any facilities at the Sports Complex shall be liable for any damage whether to persons or property what so ever done or occasioned by any member of the club, or of any person engaged in. or in connection with, the use of such facilities, and/or any other person authorised to participate in the facilities. (Note:-Clubs are advised to effect their own accident insurance against these risks)

2.PLAYERS AND SUBSTITUTES

2.1 Each player may only represent one team in the tournament.
2.2 Any player suspended from further participation in any match ("red card") shall take no further part in the tournament.

3.TIMING AND DURATION OF MATCHES

- 3.1 Matches 1 to 36 shall be played eighteen minutes each way, with an interval of one minute between the halves.
- 3.2 Matches 37 to 43 shall be played twenty minutes each way, with an interval of two minutes between the halves.
- 3.3 Match 44 (the Final) shall be played 25 minutes each way, with an interval of five minutes between the halves.
- 3.4 In view of the timing which will need to be maintained, the timing of matches will be controlled centrally by the Tournament Adminstrator, and (except in the Final) no time will be added for stoppages of any kind.

3. Timing and duration (cont)

3.5 Teams should be gathered, ready to play, at the correct pitch five minutes before the time allotted for the commencement of any match. If any team shall have fewer than seven players on the pitch five minutes after the bell sounds to commence the match, that team shall forfeit the match to the opposing team by a deemed score of 2-0.

4. GROUP MATCHES (1 TO 24)

4.1 Points shall be awarded to each team as follows:Three points for a win
One point for a draw
No points for a defeat

AND IN EACH CASE one point for each goal scored by the team. 4.2 If after completion of all matches in a Group two teams have the same number of points, their positions within the Group shall be determined by the result of the match between them.

4.3 If that match was a draw, or if more than two teams shall have the same number of points, positions shall be determined by disregarding points awarded for scoring goals, and considering merely three points for a win and one for a draw.

4.4 To the extent that equality prevails, positions shall be determined by drawing lots in a manner specified by the Tournament Administrator.

5. INITIAL CLASSIFICATION MATCHES (25 TO 36)

5.1 If any match shall be drawn, the team which has been awarded the greater aggregate number of penalty corners and penalty strokes during the match shall be deemed the winner. (Umpires please note)

5.2 If this shall still not produce a winner, the captain of each team shall nominate five players from those on the pitch at the end of the match. The nominated players shall then each take (each team alternately) a penalty stroke against the goalkeeper of the opposing team. If after five penalty strokes from each team the scores shall be level, the same players shall take further strokes, in the same order, until the scores shall no longer be level after each team have taken the same number of shots.

6. FINAL CLASSIFICATION MATCHES (37 TO 43)

6.1 If any match shall be drawn, the two teams shall have equal final placing.

7. THE FINAL (MATCH 44)

7.1 If the match shall be drawn, extra time of ten minutes each way shall be played, with an interval of one minute between the halves

7.2 If the match shall still be drawn after extra time, the result shall be decided on penalty strokes as set out in Rule 5.2 above

8. TROPHIES

8.1 The winners of the final will be presented with the perpetual Hampstead & Westminster Challenge Trophy which must be returned to the organisers at least three weeks prior to the Tournament in 1994

8.2 There will be a "Player of the Tournament" and Fair Play Awards (given at the discretion of the Umpires) at the final presentation.
