

HAMPSTEAD v. BROMLEY.

There was very little to choose between these teams on Saturday. Hampstead played up better in the first half than the second, and the game was fairly represented by the score of a goal all. McMillin scored for Hampstead in the first ten minutes from a "bully" in the circle, and it looked as though this would be the extent of the goals. Solbe, however, got in for Bromley a few minutes from time. The feature of the Bromley play, which was quite good on the whole, was the goalkeeping of A. E. Earnshaw, who stopped several very hot shots, two only finding the net. The second was not, however, allowed, Crosdale raising his stick too high, in making what was otherwise a fine shot. With the exception of Henriques, the Hampstead halves were not up to form. They would save themselves half the work they now get if they would open the game more by drawing a man before they passed up to the forward line. Teams:
