HAMPSTEAD Westminster overcame two serious setbacks take all three points, and steal a march over Beeston as the season's play-off race and battle for places European reaches its climax.

"But on the other hand we may not be affected as much as the other clubs who are going to be without key players for a couple of weekends.

"We do have two young-sters in Will Calnan and Sam French who have played for England 21s and we would love them to develop and obtain full England caps.

"But in the next couple of weeks they will be playing in our settled side and today's win was a good pointer for our chances.

However, it was two Hampstead players from older generations that eventually

Kwan Browne, to 38-year-old their Trinidadian

player/coach scored a wonder goal from open play and in the final third of the match 29-year-old defender former GB Richard Smith, playing again after three years out with knee trouble, was a rock solid pillar in defence.

Having created the better of the early chances Beeston had taken the lead after 24 minutes when Chris Proctor and Elliott Hibell broke swiftly down the left and Jonny Wilkinson slid home a cross.

That lead, however, lasted only four minutes as from Hampstead's first penalty corner of the game Smith equalised with a drag flick.

Shortly after half-time Beeston were in front again as Richard Lawrence scored from a penalty corner but that advantage only lasted three minutes as Browne won a tackle on the edge of the D and sent a spectacular shot into the top corner of the net.

That was also quickly followed by Hampstead's fourth and final goal of the day when Rupert Shipperly sent in a cross from the right which Marc Edwards slipped home, though Beeston were not happy the goal was allowed.

The visitors believed Edwards had controlled the ball with his feet and after angrily expressing their displeasure to the umpires, Robbie Gleeson and Wilkinson were both sinbinned.

Beeston did halve the gap on the hour when Josh Pavis raced upfield to set up a chance for Hibell but their late dash for a point was thwarted by Hampstead number two keeper George Radcliffe.

Standing in for David Kettle, who has been side-lined after cutting a hand in a non-hockey related domestic accident, Radcliffe made two late and great saves to deny Bee-

ston's Proctor. Afterwards, Browne was admirably humble about the quality of the second equaliser, saying: "I don't

normally score field goals." But he did not hold back expressing pleasure with three points his team had garnered, adding: "It was a key match and we knew it would be really tough so I am extremely happy.

"And it's good to have Richard Smith back in the side again. He reads the game so well and is so full of energy - he had a super game.
