MATCH REPORTS

HAMPSTEAD 0 CANNOCK I Sunday 16th September 2001

Hampstead opened their Premier Division season with a narrow loss to one of the fancied teams in the Division, who were grateful for the three points after a positive and combative performance by the home side.

Hampstead opened brightly for a change. The tone set by an interception by Matt Hetherington deep in the Cannock half within 50 seconds of the start and his shot cannoned off the keeper's midriff. Craig Carolan was then prominent deep on the right and crosses from Mike Williamson and Mark Darbon skimmed across the goal with no one available to take advantage.

Steve Dodson in the Hampstead goal then pulled off two saves from short corner flicks from Welsh international Simon Organ. With plenty of crisp tackling in the increasingly tight battle of midfield supremacy, Hampstead found it hard to create clear chances and there were few short corners opportunities until the 23rd minute when Jimi Lewis in the Cannock goal saved from Hetherington's flick. Mike Williamson rose to the challenge with a series of deep runs showing good stickwork. Cannock earned four more short corners to end the half but Dodson held firm (once with a stick stop) and aided by resolute defensive work.

The second half opened with a Carolan shot on the reverse and Cannock began to exert even more pressure driving forward through the efforts of England international, Chris Mayer. Making his Hampstead debut Dave Sellick pulled off a memorable save on the line from Cannock's seventh corner after Steve Dodson had blocked the shot with his hands. Another darting run from Mike Williamson earned Hampstead a second corner in the 51st minute but Hetherington's flick was wide of the right post.

Cannock's controversial goal was scored with ten minutes to go after a break that appeared to hit a Cannock foot but was not seen by the umpires. The ball passed rapidly down the Hampstead right and the resultant corner taken by Simon Organ was flicked in over Dodson's right shoulder, high into the goal.

Hampstead mounted a series of counter attacks and a chance opened at the top of the circle but a speculative deflected shot went wide of the post. Cannock then held on to the game with two final corners.

This was Hampstead's first home League defeat since March 1999. Undeterred, coach Soma Singh was generally pleased with the way in which the team had battled on and taken the game to opponents with such a good League pedigree.

Mikey was then taken to one side and given a good talking to by Chris Mayer, who shook his hand and wished him well. Craig had a warm session with Ump James Pilgrim which ended with neither seeing exactly eye to eye and Martin Gilbody had the grace to suggest that the visitors had enjoyed the better of the luck, whilst their visiting supporters rued the several opportunities that went begging with the short corner conversion rate.

All in all, a rude welcome back to the world of National League hockey but with the alarm clock still needed - so early is it in the season....

GUILDFORD 4 HAMPSTEAD 2 Sunday 23rd September 2001

Hampstead were left to rue missed chances to take a point from the game in which the final scoreline belied the difference between the teams, Guildford's fourth goal being scored in the final minute. Earlier Hampstead had clawed their way back from a two goal deficit. When Guildford then took a 3-2 lead after a breakaway, a pin point missed push from a few inches for an equaliser went the wrong side of the left post with only five minutes left on the watch.

Rob Turner said, "There were too many turnovers in the game. We possibly matched them in coming back to 2-2 but on balance made more mistakes and were punished for them."

On a very slow sand-based pitch, Hampstead found it difficult to adjust early on and found that passes normally successful for a water-based game failed to reach their target. With Mike Williamson unavailable and basking in the tropical heat, Nigel Land came into midfield and Tom Matthews opened on the right in defence.

Hampstead's first chance came in the third minute with their first short corner but Matt Hetherington's powerful drag flick failed to hit the target and another chance fell to him in the fifth minute in open play. Another short corner in the 11th minute saw England protégé 'keeper Taylor palm Hetherington's flick away. Danny Hall, another England international, began to use his pace to stretch the Hampstead defence, which had Steve Dodson to thank when he rushed out to block a quality shot after 20 minutes.

However a deflection at the top of the circle gave a chance for Guildford's Roly Ward whose shot made it 1-0 two minutes later. Recent signing Max Mayer-Aull then came on for his Hampstead debut, to give Craig Carolan a breather up front and the half ended with good defensive work from Dave Sellick.

Just after half-time, with Grant Maier replacing Steve Dodson in the Hampstead goal, a good Guildford break saw them take a 2-0 lead when Garcia flicked the ball over the 'keeper. However Hampstead bounced back within the minute with an intentional deflection by Mark Sully from a short corner shot in the 37th minute, Hampstead's first Premiership goal. Hampstead pushed on and Soma Singh, with a rare venture in to the opposition circle, had a shot blocked. Hampstead's equaliser came in the 50th minute with an opportunist's goal from Craig Carolan, who expertly nudged a ball that had seemed lost beneath the advancing keeper, to raise the visitor's morale. Guildford then pulled their game together and applied the pressure in the next five minutes, with Maier saving from Hall and winning a short corner for a bad Hampstead stick tackle in the 25. And it was Hall who scored in the 59th minute with a reverse flick after catching Gary Boucher in possession in the Hampstead half after a wicked deflection that bounced the way of the attacker and saw the covering skipper wrong footed as a result. This galvanised Hampstead who put together a series of attacks up their right that even saw central defender Sellick on the bye-line beat his man with a shimmy and putting in a cross. The game then probably turned with that narrowest of misses by the right post with five minutes left and as Hampstead pushed forward in search of an equaliser, it was left for Wilkinson's breakaway and powerful shot in the final minute to make it 4-2.

CORPUS CHRISTI

MERTON STREET

Although the smallest Oxford college, it has many attractive features. Dominating the all-stone Quad, the great social focal point of the college, is the 14th century sundial, surmounted by the Golden Pelican, taken from the arms of the founder Richard Fox, Bishop of Winchester (1516). At the rear lies one of Oxford's most attractive gardens, site of the (in)famous Trinity term "Tortoise Fair".

Standards of academic achievement at Corpus are high, and if you're studying Classics anywhere else, you're at the wrong college.

EXETER TURL STREET

"Stapledon Halle" was founded in 1914 by Walter de Stapledon and it came to be known as Exeter College. Rivalry between Exeter and the other Turl Street colleges has produced riots in the past, but the Turl has been quiet in recent years.

Exeter is a small college: its most noticeable features are an oversized chapel, which contains some interesting Pre-Raphaelite work and a delightful Fellows' Garden. This used principally by students for lunch and tea in the summer term.

Exeter is well represented on the sports field and down at the river. Despite recent attempts (successful one might think in light of their recent position in the Norrington Table) to improve the academic standard, the college retains a "relaxed, but boozy" atmosphere, and its most widely known in undergraduate circles for its "Sweaty Discos" and Summer Event.

HERTFORD CATTE STREET

Historically speaking, Hertford is the great survivor – from the founding of Hart Hall in the 13th century, its fortunes rose and fell. In the last 18th century, Hertford's buildings fell down and the college was taken over by Magdalen, who reopened it in 1822 as Magdalen Hall. In 1874 it was re-endowed as Hertford. Its main architectural features is the Bridge of Sighs – despite appearances a recent feature (1913) and famed for its appearance in Brideshead Revisited.

One of the poorer colleges, Hertford has gained a reputation as the most progressive in the University, being the first to admit women and do away with the entrance exam. It has recently had some sporting success. The JCR is capable of great feats of apathy, but can manage a burst of activity if pressed.

SWANTON'S CRICKET

From E W Swanton's History of Cricket

WITH AUSTRALIAN CONTESTS IN MIND

Week Two

Never in the long saga of Anglo-Australian Tests have a side been credited with a less hopeful chance than England when they took the field in the First Test at Brisbane. New South Wales had won a handsome victory over M.C.C. at Sydney, and an Australian XI had gained a moral victory there. Victoria had had the better of a draw.

The start went all according to plan, McCormick (Australia's new bowler, and a faster edition of Wall) shot out Worthington, Fagg and Hammond in Brisbane's first treacherous hour. Leyland was always a wonderful saver of England's fortunes, but he never played a more valuable innings than at this black moment. Barnett met the situation with his usual strokeful aggression and after he left for 69 Leyland nursed successive partners for four hours while Hardstaff, Robins and Allen supported his great century. In the end England struggled to the very creditable total of 358.

By the close of the second day Bradman's wicket had certainly been captured by Voce, but, in a stand marked by the utmost confidence, Fingleton and McCabe had taken the score to 151 for 2. Monday saw the triumph of Voce. Never perhaps did he bowl with such concentrated fire and accuracy as in this match. The more elderly spectators must have recalled Foster himself as they watched him alternately making the ball run away towards the slips or go quickly with his arm to dust the batsmen's ribs. Allen supported him nobly and Verity's general steadiness was as invaluable as his blowing of Fingleton just after that fine batsman — and even more distinguished cricket-writer-to-be had reached his hundred.

None of the Australians' last seven batsmen reached double figures and England, no doubt somewhat dazed by their own performance, went in again 124 to the good. Allen himself led the way this time with an admirably determined innings of 68, while nearly everyone contributed something useful. In the end Australia were set 381 to win on a worn wicket, and Voce opened the final proceedings by bowling Fingleton first ball.

Overnight came the storm which had threatened since the beginning of the match. Australia had an impossible wicket to play on, and collapsed utterly for 58, Voce and Allen finishing the match in twelve overs.

In a sense the rain was no friend to England, for it provided Australia with an alibi, whereas they seemed in any case doomed to defeat. The loss of McCormick owing to lumbago shortly after his initial success on the first day was, however, a vital handicap to Australia.

PRG

PADDINGTON RECREATION GROUND

PRG's origins date back to 1886 and a locally based campaign to create a Recreation Ground in celebration of the Jubilee of Queen Victoria.

The land had originally been intended for residential development and pressures had arisen over the conflicting requirement of landowner and developer. Unable to agree the proportion that each would receive and as the momentum to establish a recreational ground developed, the developers' eventual embarrassment at the increasingly public exposure led them to withdraw.

There being very little open space in the Borough, a Mr Beachcroft was determined to retain the site as open space. He therefore took a yearly Underlease of 9 acres as a site for a Grand Festival for the Aged, Poor and Children of the Parish in the hope that on expiry of the Lease a final attempt would be made to secure the site as a playing ground for the Parish. Money was raised and the Grand Festival was held on 7th July 1887. The Daily Telegraph reported the event and reckoned that "there was more behind this movement than just this enjoyable scene. Paddington has no playground. A township of 120,000 equal to a third rate provincial town has no open spaces for football or cricket".

Shortly afterwards the Borough was affected by the national slump in 1887. With evident distress not alleviated nor proposals to do so, eventually Lord Randolph Churchill, a resident of 2 Connaught Place took the initiative and a committee for the Fund for the Paddington Unemployed raised £1,800. The Prince of Wales and his wife Alexandra accepted an invitation to attend the Recreation Ground in July 1890, attended by Lord Churchill and despite inclement weather many activities, including athletics took place.

This royal interest stimulated further benevolence from those previously reluctant to donate. Lord Churchill was able to announce a gift of £1,000 from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and within 10 days the Paddington Vestry (an administrative forerunner of Parish Councils) appointed a special committee and resolved to raise 50% of the cost of acquiring the Recreation Ground if the remaining half would be subscribed by the public.

This further spurred the Parishes of St Marylebone, Hampstead and Willesden to contribute £8,000 and a further £3,000 was raised from the Trustees of Paddington Estate, the original residential developers. Eventually in 1893, London County Council gave £6,000 to allow for the acquisition of a further 2½ acres and in June 1893 the Paddington Recreation Ground Act was passed to authorise the purchase.

The Paddington Recreation Ground Act 1893

(as amended by The Local Law (Greater London Council and Inner London Boroughs) Order 1965)

Subject to the provisions of this Act the Vestry of Paddington shall maintain and preserve in perpetuity the land acquired by them under this Act for the purposes of a Recreation Ground open to the public free of charge for admission to any part thereof and so that portions of the said ground may be set apart and maintained for the purpose of cricket football lawn tennis and cycling or other lawful games and the said Vestry may make reasonable charges for the use of the ground for such purposes and apply all moneys received in respect of such charges towards the cost of maintenance of the said Recreation Ground or as the said Vestry shall otherwise determine and shall not erect any building thereon except such as they may think necessary for preserving or adapting or in connection with the use of the said land or any part thereof for the purposes aforesaid. Provided that a portion of the said ground not less than four acres in extent (exclusive of roads and paths) shall be reserved and not appropriated under the provisions of this Section for the purpose of games
