Hampstead just fall short as Magpies soar ahead

Hosts Harleston Magpies are now four points clear of Hampstead and Westminster in third place following a 2-1 victory over them at Shotford Heath.

The Magpies did most of the damage in the opening ten minutes as the visitors struggled to handle their high press and Maria Andrews dispatched a penalty corner expertly to give the hosts the lead.

That was in the eighth minute and just seconds later Elizabeth Clymer capitalised on a turnover in possession and slotted home from the edge of the D to double the home side's lead.

But Hampstead did not allow their heads to drop and got themselves back in the game after 44 minutes through Hayley Turner's rebound effort.

The visitors then had the ball in the back of the net three times but all three were controversially chalked off, leaving skipper Wijtenburg left to wonder what could have been.

"We're very disappointed that we lost," she said. "They got two early goals and that hit us hard, especially the first one which got our heads down but we changed in the second half and I think we could have got the win.

"They came out with a good high press, put a lot of pressure on our centre midfielders and that's how they scored their first goal."

However, there were some positives to take from the narrow defeat with Wijtenburg delighted with the character her side showed.

And she believes that Hampstead and Westminster are good enough to finish in the top three still this season.

"It was really down to hard luck this weekend and I'm confident in saying we should be in the top three, but we need to get the results to do that," she added.

"We definitely turned it around a lot. It's easy to get your heads down when you go two down so early but I think the team deserves big credit for fighting back and for keeping our heads.

"We are always aiming to finish as high as possible in the league and even though the number one spot might be tough to get to, we still want to show that we are good enough to be in the top three."
