It was the tenth anniversary, and it was the first time the HA have had the pleasure of entertaining India and Australia at this annual hockey event. All who saw Saturday's matches, whether at Lord's or on TV, will probably agree that they were a success, and most enjoyable to watch.

What a pity it is, therefore, that the standard of behaviour, in some cases, off the pitch did not match the standard of play on it. The Organising Committee were appalled and disgusted to learn on Sunday morning of the wanton damage done to some of the lavatories and washrooms in the Grandstand on Saturday. Apart from the graffiti scrawled over the walls, basins and toilets were blocked, and pipes wrenched away from the walls. The damage and resulting flooding was the worst the Lord's staff had ever encountered on their ground.
